



<u>Re-learn precise speech</u> → poems

<u>Rehabilitation task</u> : fine vocalization of speech sounds and articulations.

<u>Effect on *my* rehabilitation case</u> : re-learning certain precise speech sounds and all articulations.

Practice details

Practice time period : 4 months

Daily practice : 4-6h

Comments

Earlier rehabilitatory use of poems on my part would have been premature.

They were very efficient to consequently improve the pronounciation of most speech sounds and articulations. However, I had spent years and the first phase of "speech pure rehabilitation" before I used them.

I do not translate the French version of this document which has to do with poems in the French language. However, I give a few suggestions for poem selection for rehabilitation in another language than French. Poems used in that setting must :

- <u>have been written in the end of the XIXth century and in the XXth century</u> Poems written earlier present strong temporal biases that render their reading out loud for consecutive hours unpleasant.
- <u>not have too structured a form</u>

(I refer in the French version of this document to "*alexandrins*", 12-foot verses, which must be avoided at all costs)

If the structure of a poem is too strong, it will distanciate the speech of the person who wants to rehabilitate from "dynamic", conversational speech.

A good way to obtain poems adequate for speech rehabilitation is to purchase "compilations" of poems, rather than poetry books as they were initially published.

In France, there is a national examination when schoolgirls/boys are 17. In the French version of this document, I suggest the manual used to prepare this examination.
